#### **ECONOMIC RECOVERY FUND**

The independent businesses in Crosspool are working together to produce a funding bid for a share of Government money available for the regeneration of shopping precincts like Crosspool. The Council initiative started in 2021 with some £2m, not for use in the centre, being allocated city wide. With Walkley, Chapeltown & Broomhill having money invested in their ideas being a really positive thing, the second round of visits to areas has had the deadline for ideas extended until the end of May.

Esther Morrison from the Council, went round to some of Crosspool's thirty businesses & shops and asked them to list what they wanted out of this scheme and to see changed - banners (eg see Broomhill's) - branding - a professional PR team involved - street art like something big on the Dynasty Chinese food take-away gable wall - mural on the Cocker & Carr gable wall, repairing the 'nest' side of the shops awning, and parking sorting out.

Ideas that have been agreed on so far are for a marketing scheme, to draw in the Home of Football being Crosspool, to get passers-by to know we are here and stop. With perhaps a brown tourist sign on the Manchester Road. (Ian was keen to make sure the target group for all this is to draw in people from the west, from outside the city coming in from Derbyshire etc. Some of Esther's ideas the Forum cannot help with - any larger format Clarion or wider delivery would be impossible for our small team. The local website is however always open to enlargement and more use by businesses. Possibly, a larger Christmas precinct lighting display – perhaps planting a beautifully decorated and 'Christmas' type tree in the little triangle next to Archers. Any shop fronts uplift would need to involve all businesses for a unified look. More planters, possibly a cascade of flowers outside the Tavern and additional benches have been suggested. There might also be funds available to professional acts at the summer fayre next year etc. One idea that came out strongly is dedicated parking for the shop and businesses workers; they have to fill up the parking places with their own vehicles at the moment. The brewery that owns the Tavern & Sportsman have been approached to see if designated spaces here can be allocated to business owners to release the shops parking slots. Some major decisions will be made at further meetings, where Esther is expected to propose some firms to do professional marketing work. It might be decided to send out questionnaires to residents as well, but this is based on asking the businesses what their ideas are to increase footfall.






#### FRIENDSHIP LUNCHES

#### CROSSPOOL FORUM - OPEN MEETING

Thurs 26th April 2023. Bullet Points 14 Crosspool residents, and 6 members of the Forum Management Committee attended., with 2 Councillors – Minesh Parekh & Ruth Milsom, apologies Tim Huggan

Ian Hague (chair) welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Chairman's Report

1.Crosspool Festival and Summer Fayre preparations – well underway – see below.

2.King Edwards VII Lower School – report of sudden closure of footpath linking Manchester Rd and Darwin Lane – no consultation. Apparently, this is due to an Ofsted report on safeguarding children.

3.The demolished Plough Inn date stones – these have gone missing. Does anyone know their whereabouts?

4.Council grants have enabled Tai Chi (Wed), Easy Exercise (Tues) and new "Art for All" class (Fri am) to be supported – running costs have gone up.

Treasurer's Report.

John Drinkwater. said "there is very little to say" – we "are keeping our heads above water" and wished to congratulate Ian & Steve for their hard work in putting together the grant applications – to the Council and to Age Concern.

#### Police Report

Pam Thompson sent in a report; a few burglaries (conservatory doors tampered with), thefts from cars and of two vehicles – both keyless cars. Car owners MUST KEEP THEIR KEYS IN A FARADAY-TYPE POUCH to prevent this. The 'park safe' operation has been successful – please send in any photos of bad parking and be generally vigilant.

Guest Speaker – Steve Ellis (St Columba's Focal Minister) Steve said that the church had been a vaccination hub since 2021 and administered 55k doses of Covid vaccine! They were rated "as one of the best", in particular when dealing with needle-phobias or mobility problems. The spring Covid booster programme for over 75s etc is slowly being rolled out but might not be completed until the autumn, there is a city-wide supply problem.

The first batch has been distributed to care homes and when a date for the next is known doctors, the NHS system (phone texts) and Steve's own church list will contact people to come in.

Ian Hague then presented Steve Ellis with the Crosspool Person of the Year Award and Certificate for 2022.

Guest Speaker–Rachel Reeson (Co-op, local member pioneer). In a return visit Rachel reminded us that the Co-op supports three local causes in their area every year, so she wishes who might benefit from a grant of £2-£3k to know of any groups.

Crosspool Economic Recovery Project.

This Government scheme has allocated money to

shops & businesses in local areas to boost footfall & help in any way the businesses decide. Fronted by Esther Morrison from Sheffield CC there have been three meetings at least to date at which the businesses have voted on their priorities. Sorting the parking so shop-keepers etc do not block shoppers' parking slots has come out as important, plus employing a professional firm to look at the PR, and to develop the idea of Crosspool as the Home of Football. Watch this space!

#### **Councillors' Questions & Report**

1. The Clough Fields Right of Way has been accepted and an order to re-instate it made. This was published on 20th April so will take a month to go through.

2.King Ted's footpath closure? One Council officer said as residents had been using this for 20 years it could be re-instated as a RoW. Minesh will chase

this up.

3. Road surfacing; e.g., Watt Lane, Selborne Rd etc etc. Ruth has a list "as long as both my arms" of surfacing problems – all the areas seem to be failing at the same time. She will continue to press Amey for a schedule of repair works.

4.Pedestrian crossing? The city has been trialling battery-operating lights for pedestrians (e.g., Union Rd, S11) – it was asked that we have one for the Tesco crossing area (Manchester Rd) as a matter of

urgency.

5.Bentý Lane – white-painted "H" sign to prevent parking; Ian Hague requested this months ago to allow access to the Scout Hall ramp; Ruth will try to action this.

6.Local Plan; as this wrongly designated Hagg Copse to be 'residential belt' and therefore not protected Ruth has acted swiftly to get this re designated as green belt land.

7.Ruth has had the wrongly-placed Disabled Parking sign (GT News side) moved, and No Idling signs erected on Selborne Road for parents.

8. An Amey rep to attend the next Open Meeting? (Minesh Parekh asked – resounding YES!).

#### **Events**

1.Crosspool Festival; the 2023 Programme of Events should be enclosed with this Clarion – there is something for everyone! The Well-dressing (alpaca theme) starts with a Children's flag parade at 6.30pm on Friday 30th June and the week ends with the Summer Fayre on the following Saturday. Anyone able to help Ian & Steve at the Fayre (setting up or running a stall) is very welcome) ...

2. Coronation flags; these will be up from 30th Apr for the summer, and planters and hanging baskets as soon as the plants are mature enough.

3. Hagg Copse has some wild flower beds – do look out for them.

Next Open Meeting will be on Thursday July 27th 2023.

#### ACADEMISATION OF KING EDWARD VII SCHOOL

Friday, 5 May 2023, the Headteacher Ms L Gooden attended a meeting, with the Ofsted Regional Director and the Deputy Director. The Chair of the Governing Board, Dr Peter Dickson, the Vice Chair of the Governing Board, and Mrs Kate Williamson, also attended this meeting Key points from the meeting

The Regional Director:

- Explained that she has deferred the decision regarding the sponsorship of King Edward VII School
- Will conduct a comparative analysis of additional multi academy trusts.

- Noted that the earliest point at which the sponsorship of King Edward VII School will be considered by the Regional Advisory Board will be at its June 2023 meeting, or possibly the July 2023 meeting
- Noted that the Chair, Vice Chair and Headteacher would be notified in advance of the meeting.

Ms Gooden asked the Regional Director if the comparative analysis that she will be conducting will be within Sheffield i.e., local multi academy trusts. The Regional Director acknowledged that a number of local MATS would be considered.

#### STUCK IN TRAFFIC. REVIEW

Review of Mark Kensson, Stuck in Traffic, Sheffield (Arc Publishing and Print),2022. ISBN 978-1906722890By John. F. Drinkwater

Mark Kensson will discuss his book as part of the 2023 Crosspool Festival: 7.00 p.m., Thursday, 6th July, Hallam FC Clubhouse, Sandygate Road (Admission free) Set mainly in Sheffield and its 'Golden Frame', Mark Kensson's (henceforth 'K.') book is about two Sheffield brothers, Dave and Danny Strive, who quarrelled but are finally reconciled. Danny, appalled at Dave's obsession with profit in his running of their joint car-repair and -sales business and his apparently uncaring attitude towards their dying father, left to become a commercial lawyer in London. Both had successful careers, but remained distant. Their reconciliation begins when Danny and his wife, Jane, need to be in New York to rescue their over-stretched business. Desperate to find someone to look after their two children, Jenny (almost 15) and David (12), they are forced to call on

Dave. He agrees, and it is at this point that the book opens, with its action set over a single long weekend. K. gives us more than a saccharine-sweet story of forgiving and forgetting. Presenting events mainly through Jenny's eyes, he makes her -- intelligent, well- educated, metropolitan and mature beyond her years -- immediately take against Dave: for her, a loud, uncouth, greedy provincial, with an often-impenetrable Sheffield accent. Dave, living alone – in fact more or less camping -- in an expensively 'made-over' farmhouse near Upper Bradfield, is desperately anxious to impress her and her brother and lavishes money and time on them in order to show them the best of the area. Unfortunately, hamstrung by his lack of sophistication and his inexperience of young people, he cannot do right for doing wrong and, as a result, feels constantly humiliated. Dave's special weekend 'treat' is a crosscountry hike from his house to Stanage Edge. K.'s description of it, which comprises most of the novel, is frequently hilarious in its description of Dave's many outlandish 'accidents', all the result of his excessive swagger and extravagance. However, his walk, ill-conceived, illplanned, poorly-led, and badly executed, was, on a snowy winter's afternoon, at times downright dangerous. Jenny, wet, hungry, increasingly chilled and often feeling that Dave is ignoring her plight, can laugh at his slapstick mishaps, but these do not endear him to her. She finishes in a state of 'contented exhaustion' but only because she is proud of herself for meeting the stiff challenge and because she has been impressed by the beauty of the countryside. However, it's not only Dave who is at fault. Another nice twist to the plot is that the division in the family is not just between the two brothers but, potentially, between Jenny's parents. She spends nearly all the weekend longing to hear from them but dreading that this will be news of their separation. Jenny's two troubled relationships, with Dave and her parents, create a delicious tension in the novel, with the reader never quite sure how all will end. To say more would be to spoil the plot. This absorbing and entertaining tale of family relations deserves to be widely

#### **PREVENT DOORSTEP FRAUDSTERS**

Protect yourself and your loved ones from doorstep fraudsters by following this advice:

- Trust no-one who cold calls you.

- Never send or give money to anyone you don't know or trust.

Check people are who they say they are.

- Do not hand over money or sign anything until you have checked the credentials of the company or individual.
- Do not agree to offers or deals immediately. Make decisions in your own time.

- Insist on time to obtain independent advice before making a decision.

- If in doubt, phone a relative or a friend.

- If you believe you have been a victim of a doorstep fraudster, report it to Action Fraud by calling 0300 123 2040 or visiting www.actionfraud.police.uk. Do not be embarrassed to report this crime -these criminals are experts at deceiving people and your report will make it more difficult for them to deceive others.

#### CRIMINALS ARE ALWAYS LOOKING OUT FOR EASY TARGETS

The effective way to deter criminals is to practice good, common sense crime prevention habits. Ensure all windows and doors are locked, even if you are only in the garden, or popping to the shop. A large proportion of burglaries are what we class as "sneak-ins" where an intruder slips in through an insecure door or window. Make sure alley/garden gates allowing access to the rear are closed and locked where possible.

Keep house keys, car keys and handbags out of reach of letter boxes/cat flaps and ideally out of sight of any ground floor windows. Offenders will use fishing rods or garden canes to

access car and house keys.

Keep items such as laptops, mobile phones, digital cameras and iPads/tablets out of sight of ground floor windows while you are out or asleep.

Use your burglar alarm when you are out, in bed or away. Speak to your neighbours and ask

them to call the police should the alarm sound.

Lock away ladders, tools, and other garden items that burglars could use to enter your home, make sure wheelie bins and other garden items are stored away from second floor windows. Use timer switches on lights to make your home appear occupied while you are away. Check

FixMyStreet is an independent website, built by the charity **mySociety** to make it easier to report community problems if you don't know who your

report should go to.

All you have to do is type in a postcode — or let the site locate you automatically — and describe your problem. Your report will then go into the same council email inboxes as reports sent through by any other means, for the attention of the people whose job it is to fix it.

FixMyStreet covers the whole of the UK. No matter where you are, the only thing you ever have to remember is the web address – **FixMyStreet.com**.

There is also an app for iOS and Android app. If your phone isn't supported, try accessing FixMyStreet via your mobile browser.

FixMyStreet is primarily for reporting things that are broken, dirty, damaged or dumped, and need fixing, cleaning or clearing, such as graffiti, dog fouling, potholes, or street lights that don't work.

Urgent issues: For problems that might put people in immediate danger, such as gas and water leaks or falling/fallen trees, please contact your council, the appropriate utility company or emergency service directly – **by phone if possible**.

Non-physical things: For issues such as noise pollution, barking dogs, fires, missing wheelie bins or missed rubbish collections, proposals for speed bumps or pedestrian crossings, or complaints about the council itself, **please contact the council directly**.

FixMyStreet is designed to work in tandem with what the council offers, in the belief that there's a place for
