CROSSPOOL FESTIVAL 2023

Stand out from the Crowd

This year's festival was a successful event which brought the community together through a range of activities and raised money for many charities. This was despite the weather being rather unfavourable with more rain and limited sunshine all week.

The festival got off to a brilliant start on Friday with the well dressing, sponsored by Layers. Many people thought that it was the best well dressing ever with its depiction of two alpacas. It was photographed numerous times and featured in a local newspaper. The well dressing blessing ceremony began with a flag parade from Stephen Hill Church led by the Rainbows. The flags were made by local children and flag bunting decorated some local shops. The blessing ceremony was led by Rev Tracey Morris.

This breath-taking display of creativity and skill, crafted by Sherryl and her dedicated team of volunteers, utilized a variety of natural materials; flower petals, leaves, wool, seeds, and pebbles, all artfully arranged on a bed of rich moist clay, creating a mesmerizing mosaic of the Holly Hagg Alpacas that was as intricate as it was fascinating!

Twelve imaginative homemade scarecrows, on the theme of children's TV programmes, were entered in the scarecrow competition and displayed in front gardens for the festival duration. The competition was judged by Green Cross Chemist who donated the first prize. That was won by the Dyer family with a scarecrow of Duggee. 2nd and 3rd prizes were donated by Crosspool Fishbar and Nest café. Mr Bean Boy by the Richards family came 2nd and Peppa Pig's Grandad by the Rushby family was 3rd.

On Saturday the Open Gardens, sponsored by Alex Gage, were all admired by a steady stream of visitors. Each garden was raising money for its own charity. Eleven gardens were open including a community allotment and Lydgate Green, which is maintained by a dedicated team of volunteers. On the same day Lydgate Infants held their annual Lydgfest to raise money for school funds. Later on Saturday, the WI hosted a very popular fashion show at Stephen Hill which was attended by seventy five people.

Sunday was the celebrated street market which had a variety of stalls and musical entertainment throughout the afternoon, ranging from the infant school choir to a pop band. The weather was dull and rather chilly which did affect the attendance but stallholders said that they'd had a good day. (Page 3)

Events during the week included a Beaver treasure hunt, toddler singalong, Rivelin walk, pub quiz, author's talk, Lego challenge, Old Crosspool reminiscences and the 7.5km Crosspool Crawl race in which an intrepid one hundred and twenty-five people took part. Lost Chord gave an inspirational talk demonstrating how music can help people suffering with dementia. This sparked an interest in what can be done in Crosspool to support dementia sufferers and their carers.

The two-day art and craft exhibition and competition had over one hundred and fifty visitors who enjoyed the exhibits on show from many talented Crosspool residents. There were also demonstrations of alpaca hair spinning, lace making and stamp collecting. Refreshments were provided and many visitors took the opportunity to be able to sit, chat and catch up with friends. Cocker and Carr donated the prizes which were awarded to the winners voted for by the public. 1st in under-16's art was Neha Chonkar and 2nd was Thomas Hickin. In the adult art class Beth Eastwood came 1st and Sue Sherwood 2nd. In the photography class Andrew Graves took both the 1st and 2nd prizes. Ken Rutter was awarded 1st prize and Sylvia Hartley 2nd for their crafts and for their cakes Leonie Souster was 1st and Gillian Nottingham 2nd.

The Festival Family Fun on Friday evening provided just that with lots of families enjoying many outdoor games and a barbeque before finishing with a water fight. The summer fayre was successful as usual although attendance was down because of rain in the earlier part of the afternoon. All ages were catered for in the entertainment from Barney Baloney, Cobalt Tales singing duo and Dave Bolsover's DDD guitar group. There was a variety of stalls both on the field and inside CDYST. The alpacas from Holly Hagg were on the field and refreshments were provided by the W.I. The festival closed with a service on Sunday at St Columba's led by three local ministers. The festival team would like to thank the Crosspool churches, Hallam F.C. and the local businesses (Green Cross Chemists, Layers, Cocker and Carr, Alex Gage, Enhance, nest café, Hudson's Kitchen, Charisma, Ronaldo's, Ellie's, Spar, Archers, Crosspool Pet Supplies, Crosspool Fishbar, Tesco and Valleyside garden centre) who supported the festival in one way or another. Without them it would be very difficult for Crosspool to have a festival.

The festival team are grateful to all the generous residents who donated money during the festival. Many charities will benefit from the money raised, around £8,000 overall, including £1,200 to be shared by the two chosen festival charities. They are the S6 Foodbank and Assist, which works with people seeking sanctuary. Cheques will be presented to representatives from these charities at the Crosspool Forum's October open meeting Thursday 26^{th} October 2023.

Thank you to all the people who volunteered and gave up their time to help at events, thus making the festival enjoyable and successful. Many of the festival team have been planning and organising the festival for over 13 years now. We need some new blood and fresh ideas. We would especially appreciate someone to take over running the street market.

Open Meeting-Bullet Points Thurs 28th July 2023

Present: Twenty two Crosspool residents and two Councillors – Minesh Parekh & Tim Huggan. Ian Hague (chair) welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Chairman's Report

1. The Plough date stones are still missing – anyone know where they have gone

2.Benty Lane 'H' no-parking sign – hopes are it will be painted soon to allow disabled easy access to the scout hall.

3. The Sportsman now has parking CCTV so do remember to input your car reg. on entering

the pub.

4.The ERP (Economic Recovery Project for Crosspool) has reached the next stage so watch this space. One idea is to ask to rent some parking from The Tavern for shop keepers & businesses to free up some precinct parking slots – the Forum might have to do this.

5. The late opening of Varanasi (Fri & Sat) and the Mediterranean take-away have caused antisocial behaviour – CCTV footage is being studied by the Council and Police.

6.The missing Manchester Road post-box (top of Hagg Lane) - it had been hoped a representative of the SW Parcel Office would attend to talk about this among other things, but no -one was available for this meeting but will attend the next meeting.

7.Right of Way between Manchester Rd and Darwin Lane; Interserve had said, over ten years ago, that it would consult us before erecting a fence, but this has gone ahead (due to the

recent KES safeguarding issues).

8. Several local problems brought to the Chair's attention include still-blocked rainwater gulleys (eg by the precinct bus stop), dog mess on the pavements and particularly on Lydgate Green, dogs urinating in shop doorways, and the disgusting use of the corner on the Green by the gas valve building as a public toilet – for which the Police have been informed.

9.No-one from Amey was available – see below Councillors questions.

Treasurers Report. John Drinkwater. Despite the increasingly poor weather of the Festival Week it went very well, and a significant amount was raised during the week for the nominated charities. Formal thanks were given to all volunteers and to Charisma, CDYST, Cocker & Car, Ellie, Enhance, Fish Bar, Green Cross Pharmacy, Gages opticians Hallam FC,, Layers, Nest, pet shop, Ronaldo's, Spar, Tesco, the WI and the churches. We must remember its a case of USE THEM OR LOSE THEM with out our local businesses the precinct would lose its community vibrancy. A donation for shrubs has been received for Lydgate Green.

Police Report. Pam Thompson sent in a report; 3 burglaries & 5 attempted; 6 high end cars stolen & 1 x catalytic converter. In our NW Policing area 803 drivers have been contacted re

inconsiderate parking. Burglaries have reduced but do not be complacent!!

Crosspool Clarion & News webpage. Ian Hague said, that thanks to local business Ads covering the printing costs, The Clarion continues to remain to be impartial and independent and delivered quarterly to over 3000 households in the area. More stories and deliverers always welcome!

The website over a recent 30day period had a total of 6.8 thousand views! On just one day (7th July) there were 814, of these 766 were from the UK; USA-30, Ireland-12, Norway-3,

Greece-1... and South Korea 1!! The site is linked to Facebook and Twitter.

COUNCILLORS' Questions & Report -

1.Stile Marsh Lane to Clough Fields still not replaced..

2.Cllr Anne Murphy memorial in Lydgate Green – any progress?

3.What regulations can prevent bungalows (eg Selborne Rd) being changed into big houses & destroying privacy at the back?

4. Insufficient notice given by Amey to Selborne Rd residents to move their cars for roadworks – what happens if you are abroad?

5. Permanently parked huge motorhome on Manchester Rd – a real hazard to neighbours trying to exit their drives – attributing to one near-fatal accident recently

6.Amey problems; Cllr. Minesh wants a list of these to pass on to Amey, just as he asked last

7. Speeding (eg down Sandygate Rd and into Selborne.) – how can we stop this? Making the road one-way with no entry onto Manchester Rd? Reducing the vehicle weight?

8.Cairns Rd being used as a rat run – can we have soft speed bumps?..

9. Traffic lights on Lydgate :Lane end?, & a further crossing for the Kings Court exit. They had also asked for a DYL strip to prevent school parents' parking so close to the exit.

The Councillors agreed "radical changes are needed on these roads", but since austerity it has become very hard to fund new measures. Cllr Huggan will make this a first priority for next year's funding - Selborne Road might be able to be narrowed to slow traffic. They have very little input into planning policy – and are very unhappy about this. Only if the builder breaches their permission can something be done. The planning officers are overstretched but the system "is not satisfactory nationwide" - too much power is in too few hands and reform is needed. Local decisions can be overturned if passed onto a higher authority than the local Council – eq the Plough pub site, and now the right-of-way on Clough Fields – which we thought had been won but has now gone to the Secretary of State. Planning permission lasts for 5 years but any sort of small work on the site can mean the five years starts again from then.

Having visited the Town Hall CCTV camera room Tim Huggan queried why our local camera could not be accessed from there too sitting on the bus stop bench with a laptop trying to download the information has never proved satisfactory. Now there has been an incident logged by the police about this motorhome the obstruction it causes could prompt action – Cllr Parekh will look into this. Nothing has been done about a memorial for





KES HOME LANGUAGE PROJECT WINS NATIONAL RECOGNITION

A project developed at King Edward VII School which supports students to take exams in their home, heritage, or community language, is going national after being awarded Government funding. The Home Language Accreditation Project (HoLA) was part of a winning £15m bid by University College London to the Department for Education to boost language learning and will involve the development of five hubs across England. HoLA is currently led by King Edward VII School and supports students across the Sheffield City Region to take exams in more than 18 languages. The School has helped thousands of children gain extra qualifications by providing expert speakers

to mark mock papers, give feedback and facilitate speaking exams.

Through the project, King Edward VII School's students have also gained bespoke advice on how best to prepare for the exams in their language at both GCSE and A Level.

In the last academic year at King Edward VII School, HoLA delivered 320 speaking exams across 17 different languages (almost a third of them in Arabic) working with schools both in the state and private sectors as well as directly supporting students who may be under the care of specialist hospital services or students who are recent arrivals to the region.

Most recently, the project has helped to support students who have come to Sheffield from Syria, Afghanistan and Ukraine. Students often take their qualifications earlier than Year 11 which has proven to be highly motivational, helping them develop examination skills that can be transferred to other subjects. Many students achieve the highest grades, which can often prompt a re-evaluation of their potential in other subjects.

The original HoLA Project was established in 2011 and was funded nationally by the Paul Hamlyn Foundation. It was collaboration between King Edward VII School and Languages Sheffield, a local charity supporting community language schools. In its first year it won the European Language

Label and the prestigious Mary Glasgow Award.

As well as supporting qualification in home languages, HoLA has embedded employability skills into sub-projects such as the Film Summer School, in which students made short films in various language combinations and a programme which allowed young people to have their, often informal, interpreting skills accredited.

These sub-projects helped young people to value their home/heritage/community language skills as a part of their future career, whilst simultaneously offering opportunities to speakers of any lan-

guage to develop their communication skills in creative ways.

As it expands, the HoLA Project is now looking to work in and with schools to develop advocacy for home, heritage and community languages, to be not only recognised as a legitimate form of qualification but a legitimate form of communication which is respected and recognised as a way to access the curriculum.

Project Lead Clare Allison, Languages Project Manager, said the funding awarded for more HoLA hubs to be set up around the country reflects the proven value shown by the programme in Sheffield. "HoLA aims to respect a student's full linguistic repertoire and it is hoped the future HoLA hubs will continue to find ways to support and value all languages, including the more than 50 languages spoken by students at King Edward VII School."

In light of the school's July 2023 good OFSTED inspection the academy order issued to King Edward VII School on the 12 December 2022 has been revoked. www.kes.sheffield.sch.uk
